## A decade OF TJEKO

Ten years that we have reached children in Uganda and been able to give them moments of play, safety and love. We are incredibly grateful to have witnessed how Tjeko's vision and mission has become a reality and has continued to evolve.



We know, without a doubt, that all of this would not have been possible without you. Thank you for your generosity. Thank you for trusting us and for investing in the lives of children you don't know personally, in a country you've maybe never been to, and maybe you never will. Yet your support has enabled us to make a difference. For that we are eternally grateful to you.

The Tjeko adventure started a long time ago when we went to Uganda as a family to visit a project that Ferdi started with his Ugandan friend Bosco, 1morechild.org.

Maëlle was our only child at the time. We tried to be good parents and create opportunities to play for her. We were ignorant about Uganda. We kept asking our Ugandan friends, "What are you doing with your kids to have fun and let your kids play?" They could not answer this question. Some sent us to the broken church playground, but that was not such a success either. Finally, a Canadian friend of ours, Andrea, shared that years ago she volunteered at Amani Babies Cottage, a baby house in Jinja. They had a lot of playground equipment. They had a playground with swings and loads of yellow and red colored toy cars. The children in this home were orphans, but lived in a safe and warm environment. We went there and our daughter loved it. She had friends to play with and plenty of toys to choose from.

The second time we went back, our hearts were touched by the fact that the children from the neighbouring community were jealousy peeping through the fence. The following thought came to our minds: "What a pity that you have to be an orphan to have the right to play."

We began to dream of creating a place where all children, regardless of their background, would have the right to play. A place where they can just be a child and play carefree.

You can read what happened next in this beautiful magazine. Another effort by so many of you - investing in the future of children you may never meet yourself ..

## THE BEGINNING

After that first trip we started making plans. How are we going to do this? Will it be a park? Will it be a Disneyland in Uganda? Or will it be different?



More and more friends started to share our dream. Tjeko's contours became clear. No, it will not become a park instantly, but let's take small steps... Well at least we viewed it as small steps. But in Uganda they experienced it as enormous steps!

Tjeko Fun Village became Tjeko Fun Fair; A mobile playground instead of an expensive investment in a permanent playground where we could let thousands of children play in a few days.

However, you will not get anywhere without finances and without people, so in the Netherlands we focused on two things: Raising money and setting up a training program.

## THE CONTAINER

At our offices we had two Tjeko-trucks of Playmobil..

Not just any trucks, but trucks that could transport containers. Years ago, Monique, one of our volunteers, searched through Marktplaats (online 2nd hand retail platform) and found them for us. We were about to go to the Leisure Convention and we wanted something concrete that would clearly express what we were going to do so that the people there could help us.

We were young and passionate. We wanted the attendants of the convention to donate playground

equipment to us with no strings attached, and wanted to send the equipment to Uganda.

We stayed there for three days. During those three days we only received a broken fitness machine. Figure it out yourselves, wew the message we got. It was a total failure. We wanted to ship a container full of play equipment to Uganda, but we had nothing. This was so disappointing. Fortunately, we did not give up. We still believed that it was a great idea, so we kept the trucks close by at our office.

That same year, we did manage to send play equipment to Uganda, but the container wasn't full. With the help of many, we were able to buy brand new sketers and we managed to send them via the Baanderij with an airplane. Still we had this vision of shipping equipment with a container. ## THE FIRST FUN FAIR

I remember one Sunday evening in a hotel in Jinja, next to the River Nile, when Ferdi and Tatiana introduced us to the idea of establishing Tjeko Uganda Limited. This was early 2011, the year in which more than 30 young men and women were trained to volunteer at the first Fun Fair of this young organization.

Similar organizations were present in Uganda; but one provided entertainment and lacked education,

while the other offered mostly animal and plant sciences without entertainment. Tjeko filled this existing gap in the market by combining both. Tjeko was intended to provide both education and entertainment with a unique character. So that every child can celebrate their childhood, regardless of their background.

What started as a blurry image with an unclear voice has turned into a clear method for teaching children to cope with stress, providing insight into the importance of playing in childhood, providing space for the development of their creativity and imagination, and to learn problem solving skills. Tjeko Uganda is led by young and multi-talented individuals who were initially equipped as volunteers at the academy prior to the Fun Fairs.

Very soon, Tjeko will be celebrating a decade of collaboration with schools, government agencies, non-governmental organizations, and the general public. We appreciate all the progress that has been made over the years, and are grateful for all the congratulations we have received, and of course the donors who believed in the dream and saw it become a reality.

We go to the deep south of Uganda. Greener, colder, but above all, much more deserted. In collaboration with Compassion and Muskathlon, we settle in the town of Rakai, a town once labeled as where the AIDS virus came from. In the countryside we mainly find ... nothing. Our adapted Fun Fair is a great success for the hundreds of children who are allowed to come. The town of Masaka seems a bit more lively. From this city we could serve a large part of southern Uganda.

## TJEKO LIVE in Uganda and the Netherlands

Tjeko LIVE is an educational and social developmentoriented project, where children experience a lot of joy.



We initially developed Tjeko LIVE for primary schools in the Netherlands. By introducing children to our work in Africa, they actively set out to raise funds for Tjeko. The program is a great success for children. The message gets across and it gives children the opportunity to understand how to give children in Africa a helping hand.

However, an approach like Tjeko LIVE can of course

also work in Uganda. Not to raise funds - but to convey our message: PLAYING IS IMPORTANT!

In 2017, our Academy teacher, Peace Nankwanga, started with the first schools. After intensive training with our Dutch team, Team UG got to work.

Over the years, Tjeko LIVE has become one of the most important means of communication that Tjeko uses to support primary schools, children's homes and other NGO's in Uganda. In a series of four lessons, children learn about the different themes of "creativity", "imagination" and of course the importance of play. In a mix of lessons, stories and, above all, many "doing- activities", small teams of Tjeko staff now visit the region every day.

Tjeko LIVE is one of the four pillars of the Tjeko Method.



## THE TJEKO METHOD

If you asked us 10 years ago, little did we know we been developing a method. A rich method that moves out of a social profit motivation - fighting to let children truly be children!

## Tjeko fun fair

A gigantic playground where children can enjoy themselves fully for one day. Think of go-karts, skippy balls, trampolines, jumping castles, but also theater, creativity, and relaxation.



Tjeko doesn't just want to give people something, but also equip them. African young adults are trained at the Tjeko Academy. They receive training in, among other things, children's work, leadership, presentation, and communication.

## Tjeko live

We are active in many primary schools in Africa with a series of lessons that we present called "The Power of Imagination and Creativity". The school program Tjeko LIVE, will be presented by locally trained play and communication specialists. They visit schools and give them a series of lessons and activities. In addition, they offer teachers and child workers special workshops.



## Tjeko fun services

Tjeko Fun Services are the Social Enterprise part of Tjeko. Our local African team rents out the Tjeko Fun equipment and goes to parties and events.

With the rental of the play equipment an income is generated from which the Tjeko activities are from. The goal is for every team to grow towards more financial self-reliance.

## How do you know Tjeko?

I once came into contact with Ferdi and Tjeko through Paul Kaars (I did a number of interim assignments there). At the time, Ferdi was still employed at Kaars coffee.

## Where did you grow up and what was it like growing up there?

My childhood can be divided into two parts. I was born with a heart defect and that determined the first part of my childhood. Until the age of 9 I could not do very much, but nevertheless I have happy memories about that period. The operation was successful so after that time I caught up a lot with sports and playing. We lived in a neighborhood with a lot of untouched land, so playing outside was natural. Building huts, playing football, and just messing around in the neighborhood. The world also looked much bigger than it is now. In our street we were fanatic about playing football, playing a game of touch, and roller skating. Got a lot of scrapes, but that was part of it. And during Christmas time it was a Hague custom to steal eachothers Christmas trees.

## What did you want to be when you were a child? To be honest, I'm still thinking about what I would like to be when I grow up, haha!

## What would you like to say to parents with children in terms of play?

Parents should realize that part of the upbringing can be taken over by your children playing with others. This develops the social skills of your children and stimulates their creativity. It also just makes you a happier person.

## What is your wish for Tjeko?

I hope that in the future Tjeko will be able to roll out her concept to countries where playing is not necessarily a given for the children. I especially find the combination of stimulating play and setting up organizations for and by the local population to be a great stimulus to the development of a country.

## THE COVID-19 RESPONSE

The year was planned. We were so excited to start the year. Our team in Uganda had made amazing progress. 2020 was the year of tremendous progress. A year in which we would see our team achieve their goals and vision.





We were about to train 40 young people to organize a massive Tjeko Fun Fair. I was literally about to take a plane to Uganda and join our Tjeko Academy program. Mieke and Mathijs were about to live in Uganda with their whole family for four months to help Tjeko progress. Maryke planned to go to northern Uganda, not far from the refugee camp, to explore the city and see if there would be a great new location for Tjeko. The year we had in mind was great ... but the Coronavirus thought otherwise.

None of what we planned became a reality. No one had foreseen what would eventually happen. We had filled our hearts with so many expectations. There were so many possibilities in the air.

We were convinced this was the year. But reality did not agree with us ...

The world fell silent. No more traveling. No border crossings. No more school. We all had to stay at home. We were all locked up. There were some variations from one country to another, but simply put, for the first time in history we had a universal sanitation crisis. Everything collapsed ... At least that's what we thought.

Without being able to go to our Ugandan team to help from up close, we have seen them grow from a distance. This is what our team eventually did:

- Since they couldn't get together to perform the planned events, they took the events to the radio.
   Every week they were "on air" now / Uganda has been listening to Tjeko on FMBusoga radio for weeks now!
- They visited all the children from the schools where we normally brought the Tjeko Live program. They combined this with their self-developed care and play package. We have a great video online that I would recommend you to check out if you haven't already.

## Film: Tjeko's COVID-Response: Care and Play **Packages**


They supported the most in need families in their own neighborhood. With donations from many of you (€ 40 per family) these families were able to spend this money in their communities. Money that goes around to help more than just that one family. Tjeko Uganda has also contacted 40 of our former students. Young men and women, sometimes parents themselves, who were without a job and without an income. Tjeko wants to be family, so we supported where necessary with a financial contribution.

 All transport came to a stand still in Uganda. Everything, including walking on the street. Except cycling. People with their own bicycle were allowed to cycle. Tjeko had a lot of bicycles. Thanks to 12Go biking! Every day our team went by bike and

explored the needs of the neighborhood. They enjoyed this so much that they created a business opportunity that is still ongoing.

Our team was able to select four organizations that already reached the most vulnerable. With the support of our donors, we contributed € 1000 per organization to strengthen their efforts.

If we look back now, we can of course see how the corona virus has stopped everything we would have liked to see happen. But the story doesn't stop there. We also see the strength that has come from Uganda. They owned it. They did not give up. They kept moving forward and showing us the greatness that is in them. This has given us even more confidence in the future. With such a team we can face the challenges of tomorrow.



**AFTER COVID-19** 


The big question is, of course, how do we proceed after COVID-19?

TTjeko wants to expand to a total of three areas in 2021.

We recently spoke with Bosco Mukiibi and Alban Mwase. Their excitement for doing this is enormous. As a team in Tjeko Uganda there is a clear vision for this expansion. Of course it is not a piece of cake to go from one team to a second, a third and then maybe even more teams. But, Bosco said, this IS the right moment!

Our people have been trained. The drive is there to reach more children, the materials are already present in Uganda. What we are going to arrange in the Netherlands are the financial means!





- If the risk concerning the virus remains in Uganda, the large programmes as we are used to will be difficult to implement.
- When primary schools are allowed to reopen (they have been closed for the whole of 2020), we see the opportunity to restart our Tjeko LIVE programme as well.
- Tjeko on the radio has been a good investment even if everything would become 'normal' again, this remains a good medium for us to use.



Even with these 'constraints', we can eventually start two new teams. The care and play packages, with the accompanying visit programmes, have already shown a very clear impact on society. This would also be an excellent start in new areas. From a budgetary point of view, these programmes (with the exception of the extra materials) cost the same as our normal activities.

With three teams we can support even more organisations and of course reach even more children.

And if we can do more in a bit - we will train even more teams to become Play-Profesionals. We are
